



Training and Assessment Update RANZCP Fellowship Program

Australian Capital Territory (ACT) End-year 2023

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Introduction and Background

The Australian Capital Territory (ACT) - Training and Assessment report is a snapshot overview of data and outlines the most recent numbers for:

- Enrolments
- Trainees and Specialist International Medical Graduates (SIMG)
- Assessment pass rates
- New RANZCP Fellows
- Certificates of advanced training
- Specialist Training Program (STP) and Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) Program.

The End-year update data is current as of 8 January 2024 and summarises activities for January – December 2023.

Importantly, the data published in the respective sections are aggregated for each state and New Zealand. However, the definition of location changes according to the member type:

- Trainees: the Fellowship zone is used to determine location
- SIMGs: the employer state is used to determine location
- New Fellows: the last Fellowship zone recorded is used to determine location

The data for this report is taken from the College member database, and the analysis was conducted by the Education and Training Unit as part of its regular reporting of the College's education activities. Numbers may differ from other reports due to trainees moving zone, late form submission, withdrawals, not paying fees, being excluded or other reasons. Results presented in this report have been rounded up to the nearest whole percent and in some cases, answers may not add up to 100%.

1. RANZCP Fellowship program enrolment

During the 2023 training year, a total of 9 trainees commenced the ACT training program (see Table 1).

The training year for 2023 commenced in February for Australia and New Zealand, covering the period from February 2023 to February 2024. Table 1 compares the 2023 intake with the same period in 2022 and shows the difference in numbers.




Figure 1. ACT Training intake (2013-2023)

2. RANZCP Fellowship program numbers

Overall, the ACT program currently has 38 active trainees. The distribution of these trainees across different stages of training is detailed in Table 2. There are 37 trainees (97%) undertaking the 2012 program, and 1 trainee (3%) transitioned from the 2003 program.




Figure 2. Trainees by Fellowship Zone and Stage of Training (correct as of 8 January 2024)

Figure 2 illustrates the distribution of trainees across each stage of training and the location. The ACT program has the highest proportion of their trainees in stages 2 and 3.

The distribution of trainees by zone and gender is outlined in Table 3. Women represent less than 50% of ACT trainees. In Table 3, trainees identifying as non-binary / gender diverse and preferring not to say are presented as part of the overall numbers and not distributed by the program. Table 4 shows the range and frequency of the age of ACT trainees. The ACT trainees are ranging from 27 years to 56 years of age. The average age is 37.18 years, with a standard deviation of +/- 7.870 years.

3. Assessments

3.1 Multiple Choice Question (MCQ) Examination

The Multiple-Choice Question (MCQ) Examination was held in March and September 2023. The pass rate for the ACT program was 75% in March and 67% in September. In total, 7 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2023.

3.2 Critical Essay Question (CEQ) Examination

The Critical Essay Question Examination (CEQ) was held in February and August 2023, where the ACT program achieved a pass rate of 80% in February and 75% in August. A total of 14 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2023.

3.3 Modified Essay Question (MEQ) Examination

The Modified Essay Question Examination (MEQ) was held in February and August 2023. The ACT program pass rate was 64% in February and 29% in August. A total of 18 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2023.

3.4 Clinical Competency Assessment (CCA)

The Board approved the implementation of the Clinical Competency Assessment (CCA) for 2022 and 2023. The CCA is based on the AAP with some modifications. The CCA will not be a 'No-Disadvantage Exam' - the results from this assessment will be reflected in the candidates' training trajectory.

The CCA was held in March and September 2023 with the ACT program achieving a 100% pass rate in both rounds. A total of 6 assessments were completed during these rounds in 2023. The CCA relies on longitudinal data points to make high-stakes decisions, unlike summative assessments, which base judgments on a single data point. The ongoing, structured feedback received during training is assessed to inform progression decisions. This ensures that candidates only proceed to submit their portfolios when they believe they have met the required standards. As a result, the outcomes from the CCA do not come as a surprise to candidates.

4. Specialist International Medical Graduates program enrolment

A total of 3 Specialist International Medical Graduates commenced a pathway to attain Fellowship of the RANZCP in ACT during the period from January to December 2023. Within this group, 2 were deemed to be substantially comparable, while an additional 1 was considered partially comparable (see Table 25).

Table 26 shows the country of qualifications assessed for the SIMGs. United Kingdom and Sri Lanka were the countries for the highest specialist qualifications that were assessed for comparability for these SIMGs.

5. Specialist International Medical Graduates numbers

Overall, the ACT currently has 5 active SIMGs. Within this group, 3 SIMGs (60%) are undertaking the pathway under the Partial Comparability pathway, while 2 SIMGs (40%) are following the Substantial Comparability pathway.




Figure 3. SIMGs by Employer State and comparability status (correct as of 31 December 2023)

b. RANZCP Certificates of Advanced Training numbers

Table 32 shows the total number of people currently enrolled in Certificates of Advanced Training in ACT and the detail of Membership by location is shown in Table 33. A total of 13 advanced certificates are being completed by 13 people, with the most common certificates being Child and Adolescent and Psychotherapy, accounting for 62% of the total. The majority of people enrolled are RANZCP trainees (54%) and the remaining Fellows (46%).

8. Specialist Training Program (STP)

The Specialist Training Program (STP) is an Australian Government initiative.

It provides funding to health organisations to support specialist medical training in settings beyond traditional public teaching hospitals. STP posts involve 6-month training rotations in posts located in priority settings such as the private sector, regional, rural and remote areas, and non-hospital settings (e.g., aged care, community health organisations or Aboriginal medical services). As providers of STP posts must submit a report after each rotation, the numbers in this report could differ from those reported to the Department of Health and Aged Care. The Modified Monash (MM) classification is used to report the geographical location of the posts.

Table 35 shows the total number of FTE by the MM rating, and the number of ACT trainees in the STP program is shown in Table 36. The STP program funded in ACT a total of 3 FTE in MM1 locations during rotation 1 2023, covered by 3 trainees.

9. Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) Program

The Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) program is an Australian Government initiative aimed at increasing the number of psychiatry trainees and specialists in rural and regional areas.

Training posts funded in the IRTP program differ from the Specialist Training Program (STP) posts as the funding 'follows' the trainee through multiple rotations at a health service.

Overall, the College has 33 active trainees funded by the IRTP program. Currently, there are no trainees from ACT funded by the IRTP.
